FONR Receives Grant

On October 5, Friends of Noxubee Refuge received an e-mail from Mr. Stuart Wilson, Trustee of the Wilson Conservation Trust (WCT), inviting us to apply for a grant to assist in our conservation mission in the area of public education. WCT is a private, independent charitable foundation devoted to environmental conservation, resource sustainability, habitat preservation, wilderness protection, and species biodiversity. Just receiving the invitation is an honor since WCT generally does not consider unsolicited proposals.

With assistance from Dr. John Guyton and Marion Sansing, both significant contributors to the success of the Junior Refuge Ranger program, along with refuge staff, FONR board members and volunteers, and others, prepared and submitted a proposal. The proposal requested support for a Summer Day Camp for the NNWR Junior Refuge Rangers, to offer more in-depth educational conservation experiences at Noxubee Refuge. On November 6, we received a check from Mr. Wilson for \$2,500.

We are now designing the day camp programs and activities. Later we will be asking for volunteers to assist with the camp and hope that many of you will be able to help. We will keep you informed of our plans in future newsletters and on our website.

Large Donation to Hamilton Scholarship

The National Fish and Wildlife Foundation recently announced a contribution of up to \$25,000 to the Sam D. Hamilton Friends of Noxubee Refuge Graduate Conservation Scholarship Fund. In making the large donation, Teal Edelen said the Foundation is hopeful it will encourage additional contributions.

27 Refuges Mark 75 Years

In 1935 land prices were low, the need for conservation apparent, and the nation was laboring to recover from the Dust Bowl and the Great Depression. Maybe that helps explain why it was a banner year for the establishment of national wildlife refuges. Twenty-seven refuges, most of them in the country's midsection, mark their 75th anniversaries in 2010.

Some, like White River National Wildlife Refuge in Arkansas, see parallels between those times and these. In the 1930s, the Civilian Conservation Corps played a "significant role," says refuge manager Dennis W. Sharp, building roads and structures on the refuge, established for the protection of migratory birds. Today, during another economic downturn, stimulus funds have helped repave six miles of gravel road on the refuge and repair CCC structures including a dam, a garage and a pipe storage building.

The 160,000-acre White River Refuge covers part of the largest remaining bottomland hardwood forest in North America and is one of the most important wintering areas for mallard ducks in the continent. About two-thirds of all bird species found in Arkansas use the refuge.



The subtitle of I LOVE DIRT!, 52 Activities to Help You and Your Kids Discover the Wonders of Nature, is an excellent description of the book. The book is arranged by season and offers a plethora of activities which require no special equipment or exotic settings. The activities encourage children to explore nature using the five senses, to relax in the outdoors, to stretch their muscles in all types of weather, and to use their imaginations as they observe nature.



Although you may have made a daisy chain as a child, have you ever tried to build a bird nest? Gone water-hole watching? Sponsored a roly-poly race? These activities are among the one to two page directions for each open-ended activity recommended for four to eight year olds. Easy to read, the activities described may make you want to "slither like a snake" or "twirl like a leaf" no matter what your age! I LOVE DIRT! is recommended for anyone who has children or works with children and who wants to create a love of nature in those children.

As we start a new year, let's remember some FONR accomplishments and projects from 2010, especially those which will continue this year. Last year got off to a great start with the Conservation Educator of the Year Award being presented to FONR by the

Mississippi Wildlife Federation. Then we were saddened by the untimely death of USFW Director Sam Hamilton. Refuge Manager Henry Sansing proposed a conservation scholarship be established in honor of Sam in conjunction with Mississippi State University. FONR joined with the MSU Department of Wildlife, Fisheries & Aquaculture to establish it. Fund raising is underway for the scholarship, and we hope that you will participate.

The FONR oral history project was initiated last year. Janis Bryant is leading the committee to collect and document the history of the area, including the establishment of the refuge and ongoing community engagement with local families. She and several other volunteers are conducting interviews with local people who have interesting and important stories to tell about the area.
