Personnel Changes of Interest

Larry Williams is the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's new field supervisor for its South Florida Ecological Services office in Vero Beach, Florida. For the last five years, Williams served as the Service's budget chief for the National Wildlife Refuge System in the Washington Office. Many will remember Williams as Noxubee's Deputy Refuge Manager who was instrumental in forming FoNR. In 2003 Refuge Manager Jim Tisdale asked Williams and Dr. Lawrence Croft to attend the National Friends Conference with the intention of starting a volunteer group for Noxubee Refuge. Their participation and



enthusiasm led to the formation of Friends of Noxubee Refuge. It's good to have Williams back in Region 4.

David Richardson, Noxubee's wildlife biologist since 1985, has begun work in a new position. His official title is Area Biologist, but he is the terrestrial ecologist for the Inventory and Monitoring Program in Region 4. Presently he is stationed in Grenada, Mississippi, but he will be supporting biological efforts in 10 Southeastern states. Richardson has provided much support to and many programs for FoNR. He is recognized around the Region as a red-cockaded woodpecker specialist. He will be missed greatly by the Friends group but will remain in the area. We wish him well and look forward to seeing him around town.

Henry Sansing, Noxubee Refuge's Project Leader since 2004, has agreed to serve as the new Regional Forester for the National Wildlife Refuge System in the Southeast Region effective January 15. He will be housed at MSU for the present time, but may relocate another central location in the near future. Sansing is uniquely qualified for this position as he is one of the Service's few remaining forestry-trained refuge managers who understands the challenges of actively managing forests for wildlife within the context of overall refuge management for diverse habitats and public use opportunities. Further details were unavailable at press time.

Blake Hamilton, a Mississippi State University graduate, will be speaking on Strategic Wildlife Habitat Improvements. His degree in Forestry and Wildlife led Hamilton to his position at Mossy Oak's Nativ Nurseries as registered forester, wildlife biologist, and nursery manager. He is a frequent writer in Gamekeepers Magazine. His experience includes invasive species control, wetland delineation, and strategic forestry mowing for habitat designs. He has developed and implemented multiple habitat management plans for clients throughout the southeast. Hamilton's passion for native plant selection, propagation, and management has opened a niche in developing habitat restoration plans on private lands through the use of native trees and plants.
