

Friends Learn About Beaver Control

Nineteen Friends of Noxubee members, ranging in age from children to adults, joined Noxubee Refuge staff Steve Reagan, Steve Lewis, and Sam Sosa on August 17 to learn about beaver control.

The group learned the positives and negatives of beavers impounding streams and low bottomland areas. Forty-four areas of Noxubee are currently impounded by beavers. The Refuge staff evaluates each beaver impoundment to determine whether or not damage caused by the beavers is severe enough to warrant action. If action is necessary, the staff uses various techniques including removal of the dam and/or trapping of the beavers. Trapping techniques were demonstrated by Steve Lewis.

However, the highlight of the morning was observing the strategic placement of explosives by Lewis and Sosa to remove a dam, followed by watching the detonation from a safe distance.

Other events are being planned for members to enjoy and learn more about behind the scenes activities at Noxubee.

Refuge Manager Steve Reagan's Reflections



Wow! I cannot believe the first day of autumn is almost here. The cooler days and nights we have been experiencing this summer feel great. Although we are still officially in summer, looking out on the Refuge I am already seeing the early signs of fall. As we reach the end of

Summer, I continue to see more and more Wood Storks; American White Pelicans have recently arrived; and egrets and herons have finished raising their young. But, as a true sign of the change in seasons, I am also seeing the first of our migratory waterfowl. Blue-winged Teal, one of the first ducks to migrate each year, are now arriving on the Refuge. From now until winter, more and more birds of all sorts of shapes and sizes will soon be arriving as part of their migration south. The transition period between summer and winter can be magical in many ways and there is only one way to experience it, and that is to get outside. The Refuge itself is also going through changes including adjusting to decreases in staff size and resources that are used to support Refuge programs. Now more than ever, it is the support of the Friends, volunteers and student interns that keeps projects moving forward and enthusiasm high. In the past month volunteers and student interns provided 321 hours of highly valued work toward Refuge projects.

Alligator Larger than Al Found Dead in Bluff Lake



BACKSTORY: On May 18, 1969, three adult male and 3 adult female alligators were flown to Columbus, MS, for release at Bluff Lake on the Sam D. Hamilton Noxubee National Wildlife Refuge.

It is likely that many of the alligators seen by today's visitors to Noxubee Refuge are decedents from the original six alligators.

Refuge officials are sure this 14' 2" adult male alligator found dead near the water control structures of Bluff Lake is the largest alligator ever documented on the Refuge.

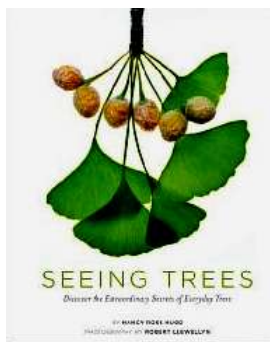
Refuge Manager Steve Reagan said, "I am very impressed by the general size of many alligators at the Noxubee, and seeing an animal that measures more than 14 feet is a one-in-a-life time experience. I could have, however, missed out on the smell." Initial inspections of the carcass indicated the animal likely died of natural causes.

This big reptile is even larger than "Big Al," previously thought to be the largest alligator found at the Refuge. Al frequently lay along the upper end of Bluff Lake levee and was a favorite of visitors. Al's skull is on display at the Visitor Center.

Guided Trail Walks

This fall another series of guided trail walks is planned for Noxubee. The walks are casual with a leader who is familiar with the trail. Additional information as to the meeting place will be given prior to each walk. Most hikes are over uneven ground and involve occasional natural barriers, so wear suitable shoes and clothing. Seeing Trees

If you are interested in a book that celebrates trees in text and extraordinary photos, this is the book for you. And if you join me in preferring the native trees, don't be thrown off by the cover. The ginkgo is the only non-native found in the book and what a beautiful tree it is. The book covers a variety of southeastern trees but takes a more complete look at ten species, eight deciduous and two coniferous. The photos are simply gorgeous with a

translucent quality usually seen only in paintings on gesso or in works done on rice paper. The book was printed in China under the name of a London publisher. I suspect one could not get it printed at a decent price in this country, as many color plates as there are. It sells for \$29.95 on Amazon but I bought it as part of an order of three tree books and ended up paying only \$19 plus change. Our late dendrologist friend, Dr. Ray Watson, would have loved it, and if that is not recommendation enough for you, I don't know what to say.
