The annual Christmas Bird Count was conducted on and around Noxubee National Wildlife Refuge on December 18. The 21 participants had a good day of birding; starting early and keeping at it until dark. During that full day they counted 99 species. Three rather interesting sightings were

reported: a Ross' Goose, an Anhinga (pictured left) and a Merlin. The Merlin is a small dark falcon and was spotted in the barn area of Nita Jean Randal's property that borders the Refuge.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT: Some Goals Met in 2004; Some New Ones for 2005

hanks to ALL of our FONR Volunteers for all you did in 2004 in support of Refuge Programs.

Here I will list a few of the high priority goals we set for last year, which have been met, and I will identify the committee chairs who led some of these projects, but do not have the space to recognize all who made important contributions to their successes. One of our goals was to begin publishing a quarterly newsletter and our editor, Jacque Tisdale, published Volume 1 Number 1 in April. Jacque has done an excellent job and the newsletter is an important asset to FONR. In late June, Mark Goodman assumed the task of developing a website for FONR and by the end of August he had us on-line with a very informative, useful and attractive site. Florence Box and her "Sales Outlet Committee" worked very hard and opened the outstanding Noxubee Nature Store on October 2, in time for the Grand Opening of the Visitor Center--to whose success so many of you contributed. This very active committee has continued to improve the Nature Store and refine its operation. FONR Volunteers have kept the Visitor Center and Noxubee Nature Store open on weekends and many holidays since October 2. For the relatively smooth operation of this project we owe many thanks to Barbara Crawford, Scheduling Chair, and her dedicated team of volunteers. FONR needed professional looking stationery, membership brochures, membership cards, decals and some items bearing the FONR Logo (T-shirts, mugs, etc.) for sale in the store. Marion Sansing did an excellent job in helping design all of these and more.

Some goals for 2005 are the establishment of functioning committees for membership, publicity, newsletter printing and distribution, education and fund-raising. Therefore, we need volunteers for chairs and members of the following committees:

- MEMBERSHIP (with members in Columbus, Starkville, West Point, Louisville, Macon, Sturgis and other nearby towns and communities to recruit individual and corporate members)
- · PUBLICITY (with members in nearby towns and communities who will establish working relationships with areas newspapers, radio and TV stations, etc.)
- NEWSLETTER PRINTING AND DISTRIBUTION (to have the newsletters printed and mailed to the membership)
- EDUCATION (to develop and present educational programs for students and the public, and to lead field trips, etc.)
- FUND-RAISING (to seek funds to support refuge programs that are not federally or otherwise funded)

Several of the tasks listed above have been taken care of thus far by our FONR Secretary Margaret Copeland, in addition to her many responsibilities as secretary and volunteer on several projects, but she needs help.

We also need more volunteers to staff the Visitor Center on weekends so we will not overwork the members of the current team. Work began in early January on the Native Plant Garden at the Visitor Center. Work will continue throughout the year on the Demonstration Prairie and Trail at Morgan Hill. Jim Taylor's Trail Walkers have identified maintenance work that needs to be done on some of the Refuge trails. So you see, volunteers with a variety of talents are needed to assist with these and other projects. We hope that YOU will become a volunteer this year.

Eagles Here, Five Sighted

uring December, five eagles have been sighted around Bluff and Loakfoma Lakes. Three immature and two mature eagles were seen in the course of a few minutes, confirming the total. Courting behavior has been observed, so there is hope the mature couple will nest on the Refuge. The eagles can be spotted any time, but the best time seems to be late in the afternoon. One day a pair could be seen for several hours off the Visitor Center deck. Reports indicate the eagles also fly between Browning Creek lake and the Refuge.

Go try your luck at seeing the eagles. Don't forget the Nature Store and Visitor Center are open weekends from 10 to 4.

Native Plant Garden Added to O/VC

The area surrounding the new Office/Visitor Center is chang-I ing. A collaborative effort between the Refuge staff, FONR, volunteers from the MSU Department of Landscape Architecture and the Mississippi Native Plant Society are installing a native plant garden. The garden will focus on the diversity and beauty of Mississippi native plants and demonstrate landscape uses.

Photos, Hints Presented by FONR Member Laird

The January 20 program for the Friends of Noxubee Refuge will feature Nature Photography presented by Kermit Laird of Starkville. Kermit is a charter member of the FONR and serves on the Board of Directors. The program will give an overview of nature photography, from working with small close-up subjects to the larger reptiles, birds and mammals and will include hints on floral portraits, landscapes and abstracts. How-to tips will be presented with illustrations and will include what equipment to use in the field, where to find your subjects, how to approach wildlife subjects, how best to compose your subject, when to make your pictures, how to determine exposure and more. Personal anecdotes from his field experiences will make the program enjoyable and entertaining, as well as informative.

Kermit has pursued professional-level photography since 1989. His intent is to build a business based on producing revenue through self-publishing and licensing the rights to "stock" photographs for a number of end uses including advertisements, cards, calendars, prints, posters, books and magazines.

Kermit's photographs have been widely exhibited throughout Mississippi, Louisiana and Texas, the most notable being at the Museum of Natural History in Houston, Texas. He has lectured and made slide presentations to many groups, clubs, schools and colleges. His photographs and articles have been published in national and regional magazines, including American Photo, Canoe, Ducks Unlimited, Outdoor Photographer, Falcon for Kids, Tenn-Tom Sportsman, Louisiana Conservationist, and Mississippi Outdoors. He has worked in a volunteer service agreement with the Noxubee National Wildlife Refuge, and has been a donor artist for the local Celebration of the Arts for many years. He is a member of the North American Nature Photography Association.
