

Nature Series Program Pollinators, Sept. 5, 6:30



Wild bees, butterflies, and other pollinators are critical to nature and to us. They are essential for two-thirds of our crops and 85% of all flowering plants. Studies have found that exposure to a wide variety of wild pollinators, not just European honey bees, gives strawberries and blueberries a bigger, better fruit yield, better taste, longer shelf life, and double the income for growers. It is similar for apples and other fruits. And many wildlife species from songbirds to grizzly bears depend on fruits or seeds that, in turn, depend on pollinators.

In our upcoming Nature Series program, Shannon Westlake will present Pollinator Conservation: Aligning Knowledge with Action. She will include information about her work with pollinators and ways to learn more or to help give pollinators near us a boost.

Shannon is currently a Ph.D. candidate in the department of Wildlife, Fisheries and Aquaculture at MSU. She is a lifelong learner and advocate for the environment, hoping to create pollinator habitat and citizen connections to nature everywhere she goes. Her interest in pollinators began in her youth and continued

through her academic career, leading to the creation of Project Pollinator in Auburn, New York during her Master's program. Her pollinator passion continues now with her doctoral research, studying the human dimensions of pollinator conservation. She is familiar with Noxubee Refuge, often coming

Refuge Update By Andrea Dunstan

Shout Out to Friends member and tireless volunteer **Joe Mulrooney** for braving the summer heat to help us keep up with the mowing.



You may have seen the recent roadway right-of-way clearing from the Oktoc entrance and along the Bluff

Lake levee. The purpose is two-fold: 1) to keep tree roots and growth from damaging the side of the levee and 2) to allow AT&T to install fiber-optic line to the Office.

Native wildflowers for pollinators will be planted in a few sections along Bluff Lake Road, and those areas will initially brown, along with the woody growth invading the Morgan Hill Prairie.

With the recent departure of Refuge Manager Steve Reagan, we have had several **interim managers** to assist us for a week to a month at a time. The manager position has been advertised and we hope to have more news soon.

As part of the re-organization of the Department we have been **joined with North Mississippi Refuge**Complex effective with the start of the new year.

Currently Sam D. Hamilton Noxubee NWR is complexed with Choctaw NWR in Alabama. This new complex will have us as one of five, adding Tallahatchee, Dahomey, and Coldwater Refuges.

This year, we will not be lowering lake levels but will keep it at full pool. Vegetation has been removed from the spillway entrances in Bluff Lake – this has been holding up to 12 inches of water above the stop-logs and overflow spillway.

Aerial spraying of Bluff Lake will occur again in late August or early September to knock back the American Water lotus and other **aquatic invasives** including cut-grass, alligator weed, and American




might also make a great T-shirt. So, with permission of the photographer, he worked with a graphic artist at University
