ARTIST IN RESIDENCE

Our 2023 artist in residence, Susan Lutz, completed her residency at the Noxubee Wildlife Refuge in March. After her stay, she was asked if she would create another piece as a representative of the one at the refuge for the Department of Interior's permanent art collection. The original piece remains on display at the Visitor's Center, while a representative piece will now be on display at the Department of Interior art collection in D.C. The artist provides a description of piece below:





Springtime in Noxubee is part of my on-going In Box Series. Each piece is a free-motion machine embroidered artwork composed of layers of polyester stretch velvet on a piece of black, recycled, synthetic packaging felt. The felt was once the protective covering for a kayak or canoe being shipped from a manufacturer to my friend's outdoor shop. The work was stitched using 100% black cotton thread. In the final step, the work is exposed to intense heat from an industrial heat gun. The space between the polyester stretch velvet shapes melts away in just a few seconds. This technique (which I developed myself) is very much like the prescribed burns done in the refuge. It transforms the area into something new and beautiful. In the "boxes" are stitched drawings of leaves found in the refuge. I used the "Autumn Leaves Scavenger Hunt" handout found in the Visitor Center. Although my visit was during the spring, all these leaves helped make my many walks more enjoyable. The colors I selected reflect the new leaves on the budding dogwood trees, the blooming red buds, and the light, sky blue that appears with every dawn over Bluff Lake. Thank you ever so much for the time and space for creative exploration, quiet contemplation, and new discoveries in nature.

NATURE SERIES MARCH 2023

In 2023 we continued our Nature Series seminars at the refuge with an opener by Dr. Jeff Harris. Jeff spoke to seminar participants about birds and insects.



BLUEBIRD WORKSHOP

In February, the Friends hosted a children's bluebird box workshop. This was followed shortly thereafter with a bluebird box



workshop for seniors in March. There were ~25 attendees between the two workshops and we hope those boxes are housing blue birds out there somewhere!



HIKING THE APPALACIAN TRAIL

In June, Kyle McDill spoke on the Appalachian Trail as part of our Nature Series. A lifelong resident of Mississippi and an educator, Kyle shared his passion for hiking and the journey he and his wife took along the trail, which was completed in two-stages.
